In true Jacky style, she was quickly back in work keeping the place sparkling!





Monday 26th September marked the start of European Week of Languages at Range High School...and what a week we had! In tutor time, pupils were asked to complete different challenges related to European languages, for example by completing some mathematical calculations in French, Spanish and German. In language lessons, we took some time to look beyond the languages we study at school and explored languages such as Italian, Greek, Hungarian and Norwegian, not only to learn some basic vocabulary but consider how languages are related to each other and have similarities. For example, we could use our knowledge of the words 'cuisine' in French and 'cocina' in Spanish to work out that 'cucina' means 'kitchen' in Italian! We also completed some activities linked to European cultures, including a Eurovision Song Contest challenge where pupils had to listen to the songs and research the cultures of each country.



The languages teachers were absolutely overwhelmed with the amount of fantastic entries we had for our European Week of Languages competition.

Pupils were asked to create something which represents European languages and cultures. It was really difficult to judge a winner as we had so many great ideas - ranging from a rap in three different languages, many delicious cakes and some fantastic posters. Our overall winners and recipients of a ± 15 Amazon voucher were:

- Bethany in Year 8 who created an engaging board game about Europe, including creating famous landmarks out of cardboard
- Raphaela in Year 9 for a breathtaking and illuminating golden Eiffel Tower
- Lara in Year 10 who had two entries as part of a team with Bethany and Caitlin creating a Spanish flag themed cake and also for a brilliant solo music effort performing the song 'Dos Orugui-tas' from the film 'Encanto'.



The attendance team are very busy supporting our young people to attend school as much as possible, to achieve their best and to get the year off to a good start.

Our school target is at least 95%!



We have already sent letters out to those whose attendance last year was below what we hoped. We realise that Covid was still a big factor last year but Government guidance has now changed and students are expected to be in school as much as possible. We are working very closely with the local authority, busy doing home welfare visits keeping in touch with the families of absent children, sending letters, making telephone calls to families and generally keeping in touch as much as possible. Reverend Matt's Q&A Session with GCSE Students

Reverend Matt visited Range High School to take part in a Q&A session with our Year 10 GCSE Religious Studies students. The students have been studying Christian beliefs, teachings and practices and relished the opportunity to quiz Reverend Matt. Each student had prepared some questions that they wanted to ask, and these were then sent to Reverend Matt so that he knew what to expect and had time to think about how he was to answer some very challenging questions. Students asked questions such as:

What is the Church of England's position on predestination?

- \Rightarrow How do free will and God's omniscience co-exist?
- \Rightarrow How does science fit into your beliefs?
- \Rightarrow Do you believe miracles are real or metaphorical?
- \Rightarrow Do you believe God created the universe and that he guided evolution?
- \Rightarrow What is the Church of England's teaching on euthanasia and abortion?
- \Rightarrow Have you been on pilgrimage?
- \Rightarrow Which teaching in Christianity do you believe is the most significant?
- \Rightarrow Why is there suffering on earth?
- \Rightarrow Who created God? What's the Church of England's belief on this?
- \Rightarrow What are the different stages in Jesus' crucifixion, resurrection and ascension to heaven and what are the days called?

Unfortunately, Reverend Matt didn't have time to answer all of the questions, as the lesson ended. We have agreed to continue our Q&A session and hopefully tie it in with a visit to St Luke's Church.



New Year New Starts

As a new school year has started, so have the PE department's extra curricular clubs and school team fixtures. So far this term we have had an excellent turnout out at all of our clubs including Football, Netball, Rugby, Dance, Fitness, Basketball and Badminton to name a few. Students have been demonstrating the skills and techniques they have learnt in their core PE lessons and are developing these further. The involvement of Key Stage 4 and 5 students acting as Sports Leaders for the younger groups has been fantastic and a great experience for all involved.



Football fixtures have begun across all year groups with a positive start in terms of all performances and some impressive results.

- ⇒ Year 7's put on a resilient display in their first ever game, losing 2-1 to Holy Family. This was followed up by a second place group stage finish in the Football Festival at Stanley High, only to lose on penalties in the third place play off. Mr Robinson was really pleased with their performances and has high hopes for the season ahead. Unfortunately, their next game resulted in a first round exit for the team vs Chesterfield High.
- ⇒ Year 8's had a hard fought 3-2 win against local rivals Formby High school in their first game of the season. The football on show on the night was exceptional and a pleasure to watch with Mr Cropper waxing lyrical about the performances of all players. A solid performance led to a comfortable 5-1 win securing a place in the next round of the Cup vs a strong Cardinal Heenan side in the English Schools Cup and then an even more impressive 11-0 win in the Merseyside Cup.
- ⇒ Year 9's, under the management of Mr Critchley gave a great account of themselves in the first Festival of the year, winning one of their games and put on a good show in their final two games. A match versus an extremely strong Formby High in the Sefton Cup followed with the opponents proceeding through to the next round of the Sefton Cup.
- Year 10's began their campaign in the Football Festival at Stanley High with two wins and two losses, a solid foundation to build on. Their next game was in the Sefton Cup against Deyes High with the Year 10s victorious and through to the second round following a 2-1 victory.
- Year 11 started the season with an emphatic 10-0 home win versus Christ the King. A mature and dominant performance gave Mr Owens real hope of silverware in his first year at the school. Next up was a first round tie against Hillside in the Sefton Cup and the team gave a fantastic account of themselves, winning 5-0 and making it through to the next round.
 - Year 7 & 8 girls won their first round match in the Merseyside Cup vs Ormiston Bollingbrooke in their first outing as a team. A 6-3 victory sends them through to the next round of the cup. Two third place finishes for the Year 7 and 8 five-a-side teams in the Liverpool schools tournament followed for the girls who gave great accounts of themselves on the day.

Child Development Cambridge National Levels 1&2

This term, our 'Reality Works' real care baby is now on loan to pupils from both classes in Year 10 who are willing and interested to experience the reality of caring for a newborn infant. The experience is entirely voluntary and not essential to the course. but supports the specification well when learning about the specific needs of a newborn and S.I.D.S.

The baby is programmed to start the simulation from approximately 5pm on Friday until 5pm Sunday. Each pupil who borrows the baby must assess and meet the needs of the infant day and night, whilst handling the baby as sensitively as a real newborn due to all the sensors on board. This offers our pupils a realistic snapshot experience of the demands of parenting a newborn.

Each pupil receives a detailed report and overall percentage. Congratulations to Olivia Wagstaff who made an excellent start to this year's programme!





BBC Music Star — Daniel Hibbert

Each year, approximately 500 young people from across the country apply and compete in the highly esteemed BBC Young Musician competition. This year, our very own Year 12 student, Daniel Hibbert, is one of them.

As I sit here and write this article, Daniel is currently preparing to take part in what is, to date, the most important performance of his musical career. Daniel has, over the course of several months, competed against 125 other young musicians from across the country in five rounds of category auditions. Having successfully worked through these incredibly challenging auditions, he is now one of just five young people to participate in the Brass Category final.



I have spoken about Daniel's outstanding performance skills on many occasions. He is a fantastic French horn player, and his recent successes only consolidate that fact further. Most recently, Daniel was selected as the winner of the highly prestigious Lutine Prize at the Junior Guildhall School of Music and Drama. Following this success, Daniel will have the opportunity to perform a concerto with one of the Guildhall's fantastic ensembles. The Lutine Prize was founded in 1982, and the past winners have all gone on to have highly successful professional careers in music, something Daniel dreams of also doing. On Friday 8th July 2022, Daniel had the opportunity to take another step closer to achieving his dream by gaining a place in the much-coveted Grand final of the BBC Young Musician.

Now in its 43rd year, the competition has a long track record of serving as a launch pad for highly successful careers. Young musician alumni include the likes of Sheku Kanneh-Mason, who you may remember performed on his cello at the wedding of Prince Harry and Megan Markle in 2018.

The search for the next BBC Young Musician will reach its conclusion in October 2022, when three musicians will perform an entire concerto (or other work for their instrument and orchestra) with a professional BBC orchestra at the Grand Final. A panel of distinguished musicians will select the winner who will become BBC Young Musician 2022.

Othello

On Thursday 6th October, twenty A Level English students went to the Everyman Theatre in Liverpool to watch Frantic Assembly's award winning production of Othello.

This modern reimagining of the classic Shakespearean tragedy set the paranoia, betrayal and murder of the original text, against the backdrop of a volatile and hostile 21st century. The students were able to watch how manipulation can cause destruction and act as a catalyst for heartbreak, jealousy and revenge.

Through intense and highly choreographed scenes the students were able to see how Othello's universal themes are as relevant today as they ever have been. Othello exposes the tension, fear



and paranoia buried beneath the veneer of our relationships and how easily that can be maliciously exploited.

It was a fantastic afternoon filled with twists, tension and stellar performances for a very accomplished cast. This will help set the wheels in motion for the students gaining an insightful and perceptive understanding of the play, and support them with their analysis at A Level. It was a fantastic way to spend an afternoon.

The performance was very educational for Y12's studying Othello for the first time, as it portrayed the storyline in a memorable way. This combines the most relevant and up-to-date research in neuroscience and utilises a solution-focused approach to solving current problems. Hypnotherapy is a safe and effective way of harnessing our brain's natural power to achieve change and find the 'best version of you' that there is. It actively encourages young people to:

It is an evidence-based practice and Lynn has many years of evidence to highlight the benefits of working with her. This class is designed to calm your sympathetic nervous system (fight/flight) and tame your cortisol levels (stress hormone). By taking the time to focus on yourself, you give yourself the power to safeguard your mental well-being and physical health; it helps to improve your focus, and insight and replenishes your serotonin and dopamine levels (mood stabiliser and reward chemical). You will be encouraged to consciously take control of your breathing, whilst resetting your internal narrative- helping you to discover the power of the 'here and now' This is achieved by using techniques such as; breathing (pranayama), mindfulness, meditation and guided imagery.

This class takes place every Tuesday at lunchtime and is currently only available to Sixth Form students. If you are interested, please register upstairs in the study area at 12.35 pm with Mrs Donovan. We begin at 12.40 pm and aim to be finished by 1.10 pm. Spaces are limited so please turn up on time. Please wear comfortable clothing. If you wish you can bring a small pillow, blanket, or eye mask to make your experience more comfortable, although these aren't essential.

Lynn welcomes any ideas for future support that she could offer, which will enhance how we support our Sixth Form students. She believes passionately in what she does and is always happy to listen, or to share her passion and knowledge. Grassheads


