# **Bully Buster Conference**

On Wednesday 30th November, Evan Thomas (8EF) and I attended an anti-bullying conference organised by Sefton Council. This conference was held for high schools from all over Sefton to listen to the views and ideas of young people. Our views would hopefully inform Sefton Children's Services future planning and would be an opportunity to discuss the prevention of bullying in Sefton. We talked about what questions we wanted to ask beforehand and the majority of these were answered during the conference. We also talked about a 14 year old girl, who had sent a picture to a boy she liked. He had then shared that around the whole school. We thought about what we would do as a school to help her. We also considered the support we have in place to help pupils be active bystanders.

At Range we have the following things in place to support pupils with any concerns or worries they have:

- ⇒ An anonymous reporting system which is located on Range High School portal
- ⇒ Citizenship and PSHE lessons to help all students learn about issues and problems that we all face in today's society
- ⇒ The school council (tutor representatives) to express concerns on behalf of their tutor group
- ⇒ Teachers and staff who pupils can go to such as, learning mentors, Heads or Assistant Heads of Year, the safeguarding team, school council and school nurse.

We also have the support of our Sixth Form representatives from the head student council team. There are two sixth formers attached to each year group. They are:

This has been introduced so pupils will feel comfortable talking to someone older than them but someone that is not a teacher. They are also here to help students and to pass on ideas to help make school even better.

Another recent programme (see article on page 6 for details) that has started in school for Year 8 pupils is the Year 10 'Mentors in Violence Prevention' group. 20 Year 10 pupils have recently been delivering sessions centred on preventing violence through looking at beliefs and attitudes. They will continue to work with us into the New Year and will be another layer of support for Year 8 pupils to use.

While at the conference we were introduced to a company called CELLS. They hold mentoring sessions that engage young people and help them to understand the consequences of their choices. The mentors have all experienced something traumatic that affected their lives. They hold crime awareness and bullying workshops. CELLS focus on trying to help young people make the correct choices and help them reach their full potential. It would be great for them to come into our school to help teach about choices, safety and bullying and most importantly the impact that all of those things can have on your life. Overall it was a really interesting day to consider what we already do well at Range to combat bullying and also to think about what else we could be doing to make our school even better.

# Mentors in Violence Prevention (MVP) with Merseyside Youth Association

Over the past month, myself and 20 other Y10 students have undertaken training on our pathway to becoming an MVP leader. The training took place on the 10th and 11th of November with the aim of enabling us to deliver sessions to all pupils in Year 8.

While we were in the training sessions Lucy (our MVP trainer) delivered two themes. Theme one mainly focused on breaking gender stereotypes. We completed many tasks, discussions and activities that helped us to understand society's influence on gender roles and stereotypes. We explored the idea of breaking the gender box as well as being educated on how to help the Year 8s tackle these issues. In the second session, we discussed active and passive bystanders and how they can have a positive/ negative effect on a situation. Lucy gave many examples and situations that you may encounter throughout your life and how to tackle them. This may be helpful, especially in school in situations such as being bullied or witnessing it.

Furthermore, this course will have a significant impact on the pupil's views and understanding in difficult situations they may experience throughout their life. We believe the Year 8s will greatly benefit from the training as hopefully they will feel they have people to speak to close to their own age that may have experienced a similar situation recently throughout school life. We do understand that many pupils do not speak up due to the stigma surrounding reporting an issue or incident, yet we feel this course will really help solve this problem.

So far we have only delivered 2 of the 5 sessions planned and we are already starting to develop a relationship with our groups. Not only do we feel like it benefits them, we have also learnt a lot of new things too. This proves that we have a gap to fill by educating the younger years of our school so they can flourish into being positive role models in and outside of Range.





Pupils in Year 7, 8 and 9 have been taking part in England Rocks - a times tables competition run by the award-winning app and learning platform, Times Tables Rock Stars.

England Rocks required pupils to correctly answer as many multiplication and division questions as possible to give their class and school the best chance of winning.

The competition was fierce with 172,258,644 questions answered collectively by 704,979 pupils from more than 4,047 schools and 82,483 classes around the country!

# Collection for Southport Soup Kitchen and Foodbank

In the run up to Christmas, pupils in all year groups, including Sixth Form have been donating food and toiletries to Southport Soup Kitchen and Foodbank. Based in central Southport, The Soup Kitchen provides a welcoming place for those in need within Southport and surrounding areas. Having been established for over 19 years and run entirely by a team of dedicated volunteers, they offer support to the local community by providing hot meals and drinks as well as food parcels and resources including toiletries and other daily essentials. So far, two car loads of donations have been delivered to the Soup Kitchen, with more donations still to take.

As well as donating food and toiletries, money was also donated from proceeds collected at the Range carol service, which was held at St Luke's Church on Thursday 8th December.

Currently, this charity is in crisis and desperate for donations, which can be made at any time of the year.

If people would like to donate, The Soup Kitchen is in desperate need of:

- ⇒ Tinned food, such a vegetables, meat, stew, soup, potatoes, pies, fruit and puddings
- ⇒ Dried pasta or rice and sauces
- ⇒ Cereals, long-life fruit juices, long-life milk, powdered milk, individual juices and small bottles of water
- ⇒ Teabags, coffee, sugar, salt
- ⇒ Cakes, biscuits, puddings, fruit pies, ready-made custard
- ⇒ Toiletries including toothpaste, shampoo, conditioner, shower gel, hand gel, masks, shaving items, brush, comb, deodorant, feminine products, baby wipes and nappies
- ⇒ Thermal gloves, scarves, socks

# The East Meru Community School - FROM COW SHED TO SCHOOL

Have you ever wondered how we got started?



Back in 2005 Ian Horne, from Wigan in the UK decided to climb Mt Kilimanjaro as a fundraising venture for a home for street children in Moshi, a town at the foot of this beautiful mountain. Whilst working at this project, Ian witnessed the poverty that families in these rural parts of Tanzania were experiencing and vowed to do what he could to help. He began talking to Tanzanian contacts and friends about the best way to do this.

During this time, Ian met Mary, who was later to become his wife. Mary's family introduced him to their home village of Maruvango, nestled in the foothills of Mt Meru, Tanzania's second highest mountain. It was decided that what was really needed was a good quality school where local children from the most impoverished families could attend without cost.

Mary's brother Elibariki and his family very generously donated a piece of land which has become the site of the school that we know today and they also gave them the loan of a building and a derelict cowshed.





For the next few years, Ian continued to live and work in Tanzania gradually raising sufficient funds through his own earnings and contacts in the UK. This enabled him to renovate the cowshed and convert it into the first classroom, whilst the other building became the office, staff room, accommodation and store.



This included a lesson on how to recover forensic evidence from a computer that has been deleted by the criminal to avoid prosecution. 


# Sixth Form Open Evening


