### **WALLY CAIN DANCE FESTIVAL 2023**

On Wednesday 14th June, 23 of our talented Year 8 dancers took to the stage once again at the Atkinson Theatre. They represented Range, alongside 10 other Sefton schools, in the Wally Cain Dance Festival which celebrates the importance of contemporary dance.

Sefton Schools' Dance Association held its first dance festival in 1989. This annual contemporary dance festival was renamed in 1992 after Wally Cain, a senior advisor with responsibility for P.E.

Wally died suddenly in March 1992 having retired in August 1991. He had been an adviser in Sefton for twenty years. Wally was an inspiration to everyone who taught physical education in Sefton.

One of his greatest loves was Dance and he worked tirelessly to promote its development. In 1988 he set up the Sefton Schools' Dance Association for teachers, resulting in this annual Dance Festival and Days of Dance. Wally was keen to encourage the teaching of Contemporary Dance in schools as he felt it gave all children, whatever their ability, gender or age, an opportunity to express themselves.



### Year 10 win their first bit of silverware

Congratulations to Range High School's Year 10 football team, who picked up their first bit of silverware last week. The game was played at Jeffrey Humble Sports Centre in Aintree, on a sunny but very windy afternoon. The opponents were Ridgeway High School from the Wirral, whom we have played twice previously, being on the losing end the last time we met. The opponents won the coin toss and chose to switch sides and play with the wind behind them. Their decision was presumably based on them trying to get the game wrapped up in the first half, but it ultimately played in our favour.

Range High started the game solidly and despite having strong winds and the sun to play against, they kept the ball well in the first 20 minutes and dominated possession. Ridgeway struggled to get the ball off Range, but there were few chances from either team up to this point. For the last ten minutes of the first half, Range had their backs against the wall and defended valiantly against a ball that felt like it was being sucked towards our goal. A solid back four made up of four students called Tom swept up anything that came their way. Tom Moore, who was playing right back, aggressively defended anything and everything he came up against. The same can be said for Tom Henderson at left-back, whose industry and relentlessness to win the ball was, as always, near perfect. He used his pace and fitness to work the left wing and put added pressure in the form of attack, as well as winning every 50/50 he had.

A special mention to Tom Jones and Tom Pike at centre back. The danger point for us came when our opponents played the ball over the top. With strong winds and the sun in their eyes, this was a particular threat. Tom Jones did whatever any good defender would do and consistently stepped forward at every opportunity and attacked the ball before it had the chance to bounce. Every time the ball looked like it could make it to the target man, Tom intercepted and dealt with the situation commandingly. He could do this with confidence, as Tom Pike was behind him to sweep up any loose balls and used his strength, pace and height to defend the Range goal from any attacking encounters. The breakthrough nearly came for Ridgeway near the end of the first half, when a well-struck shot hit the underside of the crossbar from 25 yards. However, the team held strong and kept the game at 0-0 as we finished the first half.

Range now entered the second half with the wind behind them and this opened up more opportunities to test the Ridgeway keeper. The game was won and lost in midfield, with constant battles for possession from Range's star midfielders, who swarmed Ridgeway players whenever they had the ball. The Captain, Ollie Buch-Platt was given the difficult task of man-marking their star man and he never let him out of his sight. He won the majority of the duels fought, broke up play and relentlessly stalked his man, not giving him an inch. Corey O'Connor and Joe Kirwan, at times, looked like they were playing for fun and were turning their opponents inside out and frequently providing chances. The two wide men, Christian Brennan and Liam McIntosh provided us with pace and width and an attacking threat that kept them on the back foot. The breakthrough for Range came about ten minutes into the second half. Joe Kirwan let fly from 30 yards and rattled the crossbar. Less than a minute later, another opportunity presented itself and this time he was on target and put it away into the bottom right corner from 25 yards to put Range 1-0 up.

Range was growing in confidence and started to dominate possession again, however, the threat still remained and it was important they kept their shape and composure. A handball momentarily paused the game to give the players a breather. However, an off the ball incident and a moment of madness from a Ridgeway player saw him given his marching orders for violent conduct. This seemed to be a major turning point in the game and meant that Ridgeway had it all to do from this point. Playing with confidence, Range continued to press their opponents in search of the second goal. A ball was pumped forward from midfield and appeared to be an easy collection for the keeper but the ball held up on the heavy 4G pitch and sat up nicely for Oliver Plunkett to put away with his head. This was a poacher's finish and brilliant pressing play from the number 9. A



The game seemed to be heading Range's way and the team was playing with increasing confidence. The threat never left though and a 25-yard shot from Ridgeway's star midfielder seemed to be destined for the top corner, but goalkeeper Luke Faraday watched it intensely and timed his save perfectly to tip it over the bar. An unbelievable bit of athleticism, which could have saved the game. Luke kept his composure for the entirety of the match and used his outfield experience to distribute the ball well and keep the game moving. They worked the ball around the pitch and played some fantastic team passing. Corey O'Connor then waltzed his way through a number of players before directing a shot from 20 yards into the bottom left-hand corner to seal the game. Range then just had to see out the final ten minutes. Substitutes Callum Hannaway and Liam Hall came on to provide extra legs up front and extra support for the defence. Callum pressed with intensity when he came on and Liam steadied the ship at defensive midfield.

This was a well-deserved win from a strong team of players, who have fallen short in the semi-final on a number of occasions. They have also had their football disrupted by lockdown, which makes a win like this even more rewarding. Sport is a very valued part of our curriculum here at Range and we recognise the importance it plays in shaping people's lives. Congratulations to the lads, who sign off the year on a high note and will forever be remembered in our rich sporting history.

### Science Club

Over the past three weeks, the Year 7 science club has been thoroughly investigating a forensic science case. The students have been involved in a variety of activities, such as determining the nature of a substance found on the victim, using pH measurements through universal indicator to identify whether it is an acid or alkali, using chromatography to compare the ink found on the victim with the suspects' ink in their pens, and identifying potential suspects by matching fingerprints obtained from the crime scene. ### Careers Hours

Exhibitors included Peel Ports, Liverpool Heart and Chest Hospital, the Royal Navy, Merseyside Training, Hugh Baird College and the University of Central Lancashire, to name but a few.

Students enjoyed their time at the fair and gave lots of positive feedback. ### Find a space and nature will come

Over the past two years, a group of trees has been planted in the corner of a field, including oak, silver birch, rowan, dogwood, cherry and more. Many of the trees have grown considerably and a small but significant copse has been established. Additionally, European alder and other trees have naturally taken root in the area. This space has become a habitat for wildlife, and the Geography department has taken steps to encourage more wildlife to make it their home by purchasing and placing insect homes in the copse. Students have also participated in clearing litter and plastic waste from the area.

The corner area has been transformed into a space for wildlife, with the Geography department purchasing insect homes to encourage the flourishing of bees and other insects. A group of students, Lilly Zajitschek, Sophia Bevins, and Lilly Craig, helped to clear the space of litter and place the insect homes, despite the high temperatures. Their efforts were successful in clearing the area of plastic waste that had accumulated in the corner of the field.



### More animal visitors

The copse is home to a variety of birds including pheasants and a recently spotted grey heron. Many smaller insects and amphibians have also made it their home. The hope is for the area to become both a learning environment for pupils and a relaxing space in the future.





### Year 10 pupils take a trip to Ingleton Falls Waterfall Trail

A group of Year 10 Geography students recently visited Ingleton Falls Waterfall Trail to enhance their understanding of the geographical features of a river's upper course. Although they had learned about waterfalls and gorges in the classroom, the trip provided an opportunity to see them in real life. The hope is that this experience will not only improve their learning but also encourage an interest in the natural environment.

Ingleton Waterfalls Trail is situated in the Yorkshire Dales, on the edge of Ingleton village. The trail offers breathtaking views of the waterfalls, following a well-defined footpath that runs close to the edge of the two rivers. The trail is 4.3 miles (7km) long and takes between 2 to 4 hours to complete, with a steady incline and some uneven ground.





To avoid becoming a victim of online crime you don't need to be a computer expert. Developing a few good online habits drastically reduces your chances of becoming a victim of cyber-crime, makes you less vulnerable and lets you use the web safely.

### Tips for parents and guardians

The internet lets children connect with friends and learn new things. But there are also dangers to going online, and children can be particularly vulnerable.

Talking to your child is one of the best ways to keep them safe online. By understanding the risks and keeping yourself up to date on the latest technology, websites and social networks you can help your child enjoy the internet safely and securely.

### To help protect your children online:

- keep computers and games consoles in family rooms where you can monitor activity.
- install parental control software or activate parental controls through your Internet Service Provider (ISP) to prevent access to inappropriate content.
- 'friend' or 'follow' your child on social networks, so you can see how they're using them.
- check age restrictions for websites or social networks to make sure your children are allowed to
  join.
- advise your child not to post personal information or any images they wouldn't want everyone to see.
- check their social media accounts' privacy settings, so their posts are only seen by friends and their location isn't tracked.
- avoid using webcams unless talking to close friends or family, and consider covering it when not in use
- monitor how your children use the internet and watch for any secretive behaviour.
- encourage your child to be open about what they do online and who they're talking to, insist you go with them if they wish to meet online friends.
- ensure the games your children play online are age appropriate.

### **Bloom programme for Year 10**

During this half-term, a group of Year 10 pupils have had the opportunity to take part in a UK-wide programme for 14-16 year-olds which focuses on supporting young people's mental health resilience. Delivered in schools and colleges, Bloom equips young people with the tools and knowledge to maintain their mental health through life's transitions, both now and in the future.

Pupils have taken part in six 1 hour sessions and had a final celebration session before the end of the term. These have been on the following sessions:

- Resilience
- Exam pressure
- Friendships (bullying, conflict)
- Managing studies
- Social pressures
- Decisions about the future

These sessions were delivered by an external trainer called Jon Jones. He was supported by three of our teaching staff Mrs Holker, Mrs Longdon and Mrs Povey, who will be delivering this programme in subsequent years.

Mrs Holker made this comment about the programme:

'The Bloom programme has been a great opportunity for some of our pupils to get together and look at ways of dealing with different life pressures. We have looked at resilience, exam stress, friendship issues and social pressures. The pupils have discussed various scenarios and been shown tools and strategies to help them in the future.'

Mrs Povey and Mrs Longdon made this comment about the programme

'Bloom sessions for Year 10 have focused on equipping students with skills and techniques to promote resilience. Students have been able to discuss various scenarios and generate a 'tool kit' to support them in the future. These skills are invaluable as students move into Year 11 and the Year 10 students embraced each session with a positive attitude and an open mind!'

### Year 12—Geography

### NEA Fieldwork

Over the past few weeks, Year 12 geography students have been participating in their Non-Examined Assessment (NEA) fieldwork data collection, which accounts for 20% of their final grade. The students collected vital data on both human and physical geography over the course of four days.

- On the first day, the students visited Formby Sand Dunes, where they examined sand dune succession and the impact of human activity on the natural environment.
- Crosby Beach was the destination for the second day, where pupils investigated different types of coastal management strategies and their effectiveness. They collected data on beach gradients and used cost-benefit analysis for future reference.
- On the third day, the students visited Southport, where they collected a significant amount of data on the area's management and its impact on international migration. This linked with the topics of globalisation and diverse places.
- ⇒ Finally, on the fourth day, the students visited Formby again, collecting data and opinions on the perception of place and conflicts and tensions in the area.











### Year 12 students visit Edge Hill

A number of Year 12 Geography students took the opportunity to experience a day in the life of a student at Edge Hill University. They took part in a number of different sessions throughout the day including workshops on different subject areas and a tour of the campus. They started the day by listening to a talk delivered by a member of the Student Recruitment team. They were given an introduction to the event and an overview of their taster day courses. Each student also received an Edge Hill University tote bag which included a pen, notepad, a personal statement booklet, an accommodation guide and a student finance guide. They then took part in Geography and Geology taster sessions, which took place in the Geoscience building on campus. In this session they explored the impact of disasters on a hypothetical community during its development, allowing them to shape the communities and attempt to miti-

gate against such disasters. They had to consider how challenging this can be in the real world, the factors that need to be considered when risk management planning. After this, pupils then had a tour of the campus by one of the senior students. They were taken to see where they would study, where they would live and the facilities that they would get to use as part of their course. Edge Hill has expanded massively in recent years and it was nice to see the facilities they have available to them. Pupils then made their way to the hub area where they were given a free lunch. There was also an opportunity for them to have a personal tour of the campus themselves during this time. After lunch, the students then attended a sociology workshop where they explored a number of topics in sociology such as critical autism and modern-day terrorism. They discussed the role of the media in the perception they give of pressure groups and how they can have a massive influence on a narrative. To finish the day, the pupils had one final talk with a student ambassador. They discussed their journey so far and gave students the opportunity to find out about their life during university and how they found their experience. This was a very valuable day which gave our students a good understanding of university life and hopefully helped them make a more informed decision about their future.
