This initiative is part of a broader effort to introduce more fieldwork opportunities into the Key Stage 3 Geography curriculum, helping students develop essential skills for future study.

Design & Technology Department: Rotary Club Technology Tournament

We were invited to take part in a technology tournament, an annual event run by the Rotary Club of Southport. The event is hosted at Greenbank High School and each year a different unseen challenge is set. We took three teams of four from Year 8, Year 10 and Year 12. We took volunteers from our high achieving Year 8 D&T students and the Year 10 and Year 12 teams were selected from our GCSE Design & Technology course, Cambridge National Engineering course, and A Level Product Design course.

As said, the unseen challenge was revealed at the start of the day. The students were to design and construct a device to vertically launch a rocket (plastic golf ball). The rocket had to pass through a hoop 1.5 meters directly above the launch pad and then as high as possible past that, before landing as close as possible to the original take-off point. The person launching the rocket had to be at least 1 meter away from the device. On top of that, the KS4 teams had to land the rocket using a parachute and the KS5 teams had to release their rocket and parachute from another capsule!

Limited, basic materials were provided and the competition was judged on design concepts (including an environmental based sponsor's logo), teamwork and of course, how well the objective was completed.

It was great to see all teams involved diving straight into detailed discussion and concept sketching during their allocated thinking and planning time. This was really brought to life once they were let loose on the materials.

Throughout the day, volunteers from the Rotary Club circulated to judge and to offer helpful hints to the teams, culminating in a launch session at the end of the day. Many concepts were tried, rejected and modified with the teams showing great resilience, determination and team thinking.

I am pleased to report that all three of our teams met the objectives of the task and completed successful launches and landings. Our Year 8 team finished just outside the top three and both Year 10 and Year 12 finished runners-up.

We all had a thoroughly enjoyable day and our teams represented the school exceptionally well, demonstrating fantastic design thinking, problem solving and construction skills. The Year 10 even dedicated their sponsor's logo to our school environmental champion, Mr Hughes!

OPERATION PROSPECT and Merseyside Police

On Tuesday 11th March Merseyside Police came into school and delivered an assembly to all pupils in Year 8, 9 and 10 on Gun and knife crime. This initiative is called Operation Prospect. OPERATION PROSPECT- focused on reducing serious violence in the form of knife and gun crime in Merseyside and awareness of exploitation. It is rooted in the belief, that every young person has the power to shape a safer and more positive future for themselves, their families and the communities they live in. Through education and open discussion, we aim to equip young people with the knowledge, confidence, and support they need, to make responsible choices and contribute to the safety and well-being of those around them.



In our sessions, we emphasise three key points to remember:

1. Think about the consequences of your actions – Understand how carrying weapons and engaging in violence can have a devastating ripple effect on individuals, families, and the community they live in.
2. Consider and contribute to the safety of your community – By making thoughtful choices and looking after each other, each young person can play a crucial role in preventing violence and promoting safety and reassurance in their community.
3. Have the confidence to speak to a trusted person – We encourage young people to seek help when they need it and know how to report concerns, ensuring that nobody has to face these challenges alone.

The objectives of the initiative includes: an understanding of the role of firearms officers, identifying the risks associated with weapons, and highlighting the effects of violence on victims' families and the community. Additionally, we encourage discussion around joint enterprise and equipping young people with the knowledge of how to safely report concerns or worries.

By addressing these critical issues, we aim to make a meaningful impact on the safety and future of Merseyside, creating a stronger, more connected community where violence is actively prevented, and lives are protected.

OPERATION PROSPECT is a proactive step toward ensuring young people are informed, empowered, and supported as they take ownership of their role in creating a safer Merseyside for all.

The assembly was very interactive, and pupils were encouraged to take an active role and take part in a question-and-answer session at the end of the assembly. Pupils embraced this opportunity positively and asked the different officers lots of relevant questions about the assembly content and the wider work of the Police. Many of our Year 10 pupils stayed behind further to talk about career opportunities within the Police force – maybe we will see some of them return to Range in years to come to provide this type of support to future generations of pupils!

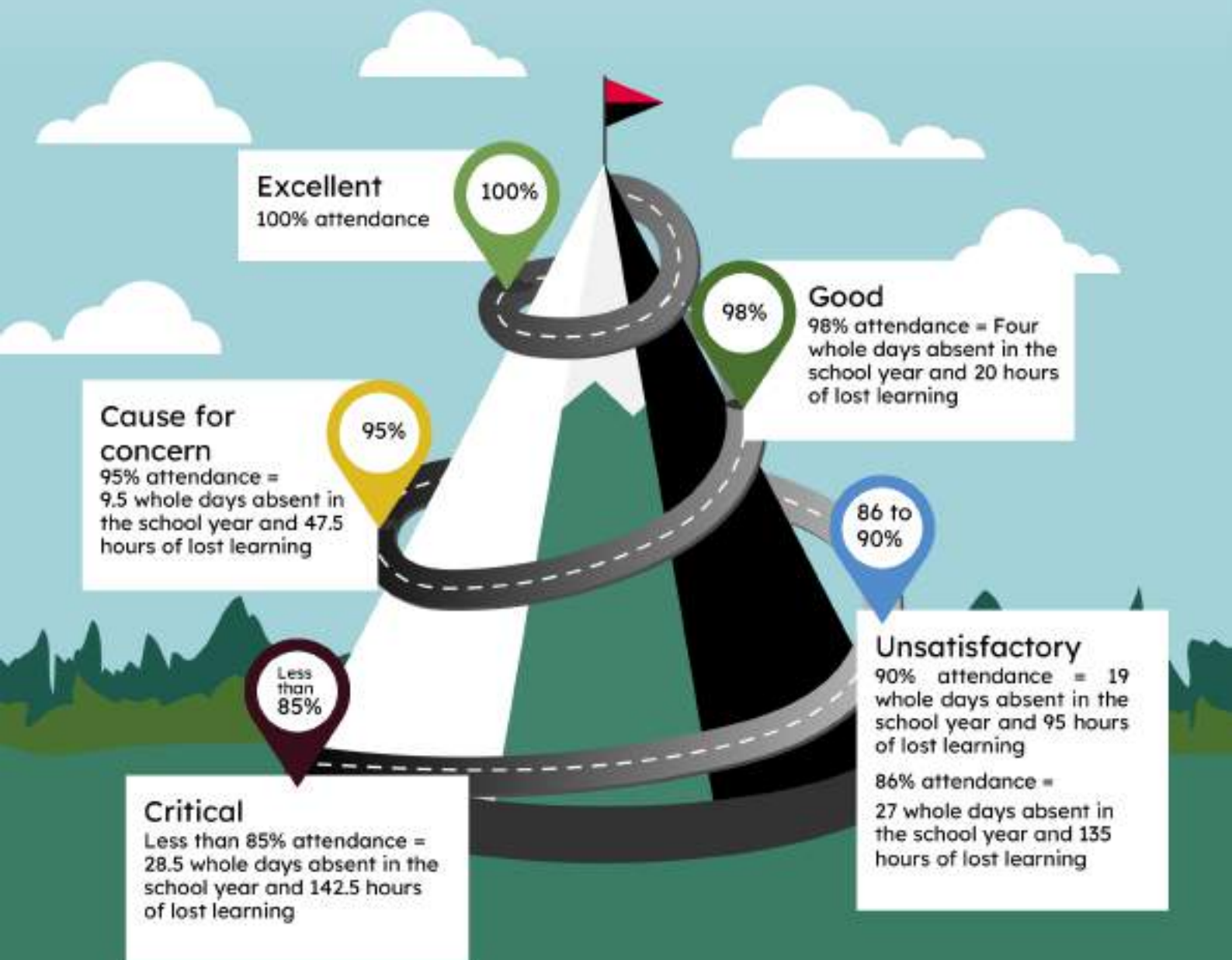
Mr Robinson London Marathon

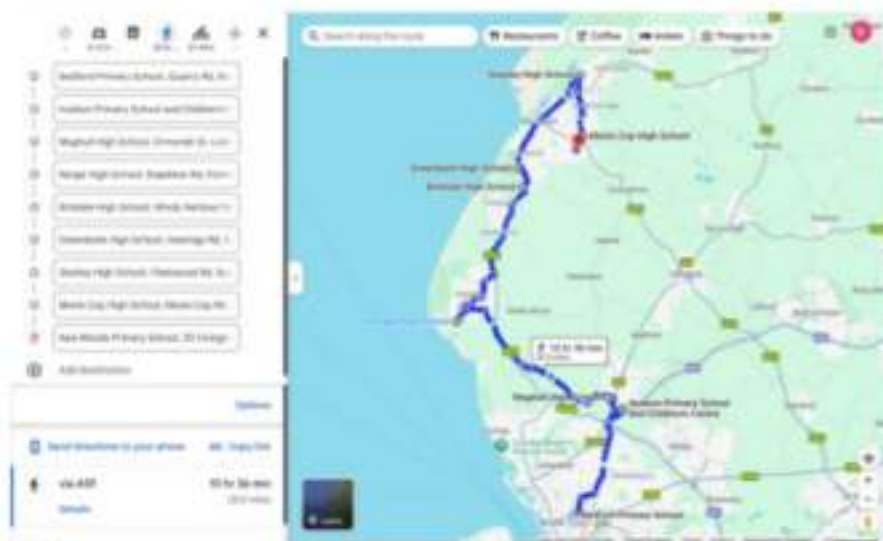

Navigating exam season

Supporting your child to beat exam stress

Exams can be a challenging time for young people, and many young people can feel worried and stressed in the lead up to exams. As parents and carers, it can be difficult to know what we can do to support them. We've shared some tips on supporting your child if they're feeling stressed about exams.



Look for signs of stress

Stress can present differently in everyone. Signs of stress could include not sleeping or sleeping more than usual, losing interest in food or eating more than usual, being irritable, having headaches or stomach aches, being negative, feeling hopeless, or not enjoying activities they previously enjoyed.

If you notice your child is struggling, ask them what you can do to help them.



Talk about stress and nerves

Remind your child that it's perfectly normal to feel worried or stressed about their exams. The key is to put these nerves to positive use.

Talk openly about how you cope with your own stressful situations, so your child has a positive role model for managing their emotions and time.

Support your child to create a routine

Routines and rituals can help your child keep healthy habits, and can help you ensure your child is getting enough sleep and eating well.

If they haven't already, encourage your child to create a revision plan or timetable, splitting their day up into chunks. Encourage them to take regular breaks - which they could use to have a meal, get some exercise or unwind - and try to discourage them from staying up late revising.

Supporting your child to beat exam stress



Try not to add to the pressure

Many young people feel pressure to do well in their exams to make their teachers, or families proud. Try not to add to this pressure. Be reassuring, positive, and help put things into perspective. Remind them that there is more to life than their grades, and their results don't define who they are. Reassure them you will be proud of them 'no matter what'.



Make yourself available to listen

Sometimes your child may not want to talk, and it's important we don't force them to have a conversation they don't want to have. Make yourself available but don't pressure them to talk.

You may find that your child opens up in situations where they feel less pressure – for example when you're in the car on the way home from school, or during a walk.





Help them unwind after exams

Find ways to help your child unwind after each exam, so they don't dwell on things they could have done better or differently. After each exam, you and your child could watch a film or enjoy your favourite meal together, before they start revising for the next test.



Seek additional support

If you're concerned about your child's stress, or find they don't want to talk to you, encourage them to seek support elsewhere. This could be someone at their school, or an organisation such as Shout or Childline.

Supporting History Learning Over the Easter Holidays

As the Easter holidays approach, it's a fantastic opportunity to bring key historical topics to life for students, providing them with real-world context and a deeper understanding of these complex periods in history. Below are some ideas to support your child's history learning and spark a passion for the past.

Year 7 - Roman and Medieval History

- **Roman Chester (Chester, Cheshire)** - Visit the Chester Roman Amphitheatre, where gladiators once fought, and walk along the Chester City Walls, some of the best-preserved Roman fortifications in the UK. Discover the remains of Deva Victrix, the Roman fort, and the Roman Gardens that provide a glimpse of daily Roman life.
- **Norton Priory (near Runcorn)** - Visit the medieval monastery, gardens and museum which showcases medieval artefacts, including pottery, tools, and even medieval graffiti.
- **The Museum of Liverpool** - Engage in interactive activities to uncover the past. This fun, hands-on gallery helps children learn how historians use clues to piece together history, with a focus on local history, including the Romans and medieval period.

Year 8 - Tudor, Stuart, Georgian, and Victorian Britain

- **Rufford Old Hall** - This historic site offers a glimpse into Tudor life, architecture, and the role of wealthy families during the period.
- **The Museum of Liverpool** - Explore the Great Port Exhibition and learn about Liverpool's significant role in global trade and the transatlantic slave trade. This exhibition offers crucial context for understanding the rise of the British Empire and the complex history of Liverpool as a port city. You can also visit the Benin Exhibition, where you'll discover the rich history, art, and culture of the ancient Kingdom of Benin. Featuring the famous Benin Bronzes, this exhibition raises important questions about Britain's colonial past and legacy.

Year 9 - World War One, World War Two and the Holocaust

- **Western Approaches Museum (Liverpool)** - Visit the former headquarters of the Liverpool-based Battle of the Atlantic command during World War II. The museum allows students to step into a real WWII operations room and learn about the pivotal role Liverpool played in the Battle of the Atlantic, ensuring vital supplies were transported during the war.

GCSE - Elizabethan England, The Cold War, Crime and Punishment, USA: Civil Rights and the Vietnam War

- **Speke Hall (Liverpool)** - The hall is a stunning example of Tudor architecture, and students can learn about life in the 16th century, including the role of the hall's inhabitants during the Tudor period.
- **The Imperial War Museum North (Manchester)** - Visit the Cold War Exhibition and look at the political tensions, nuclear arms race, and the impact of the Cold War on the global order. The museum also houses an exhibition on the Vietnam War. It offers a comprehensive view of the war, its impact on soldiers and civilians, and the political controversy surrounding the conflict.
- **The Clink at St. George's Hall (Liverpool)** - Explore the history of crime and punishment in Victorian Liverpool. The museum exhibits the harsh conditions of Victorian-era prisons and provides a strong context for understanding societal attitudes towards crime during the Victorian period.

CERN Trip 2024

Our trip began at 4 am meeting at Liverpool Airport ready for our flight. After a short flight we landed in Geneva airport and hopped on the bus to our hotel to drop off our belongings before heading to the United Nations. In the eye-opening tour around the Palais des Nations, we learnt a lot about the structure and function of the United Nations and gained a real insight into the importance of the organisation in our society. I really enjoyed sitting in on the human rights conference of Amazigh women in Northern Africa as it really helped me recognise how the actions of the UN improve the livelihoods of people of countless backgrounds. We finished the day off by heading back to our hotel and getting some food from the local shopping centre. We woke up early the next morning to grab a quick breakfast and headed straight to CERN. Our visit began by exploring several exhibitions that demonstrated the work of scientists at CERN through a variety of apparatus such as cloud chambers that are used regularly to help uncover the mysteries of the universe. I learnt a lot about quantum physics and the beginnings of the universe. The second part of our visit included a tour of several research facilities at CERN. After briefly crossing the Swiss border into France, we experienced one of the cryogenic research centres where our guide explained how particle accelerators work and described some of the work taking place. Our next stop was to the anti-matter factory where scientists carry out a range of experiments to learn more about the interactions of anti-matter with regular matter, which can help us understand how the universe came to be. We concluded the day with some very competitive games of bowling before again heading back to the hotel for another early start.

Our final day began with a trip to the History of Science Museum, where we learnt about the fundamentals of physics. Experiments dotted around the museum helped us to understand how many of these principles and laws apply to everyday life. We then went on to visit the Christmas markets along the lake waterfront which was the perfect opportunity to test out some questionable French skills. With views of Mont-Blanc and the Jet d'Eau in the background, it was the ideal place to unwind from the amazing but busy weekend and enjoy some local food. As the sun set, we ventured into the Genevan old town with some of the most astounding traditional architecture and Christmas decorations. Before long, we had to head back to the hotel to collect our belongings and make our way to the airport for another short flight back home.

This trip really helped me understand more about the applications of physics and chemistry which will be extremely useful to my studies. Aside from the educational element, it was an incredible opportunity to immerse ourselves in Swiss culture and experience picturesque Geneva.

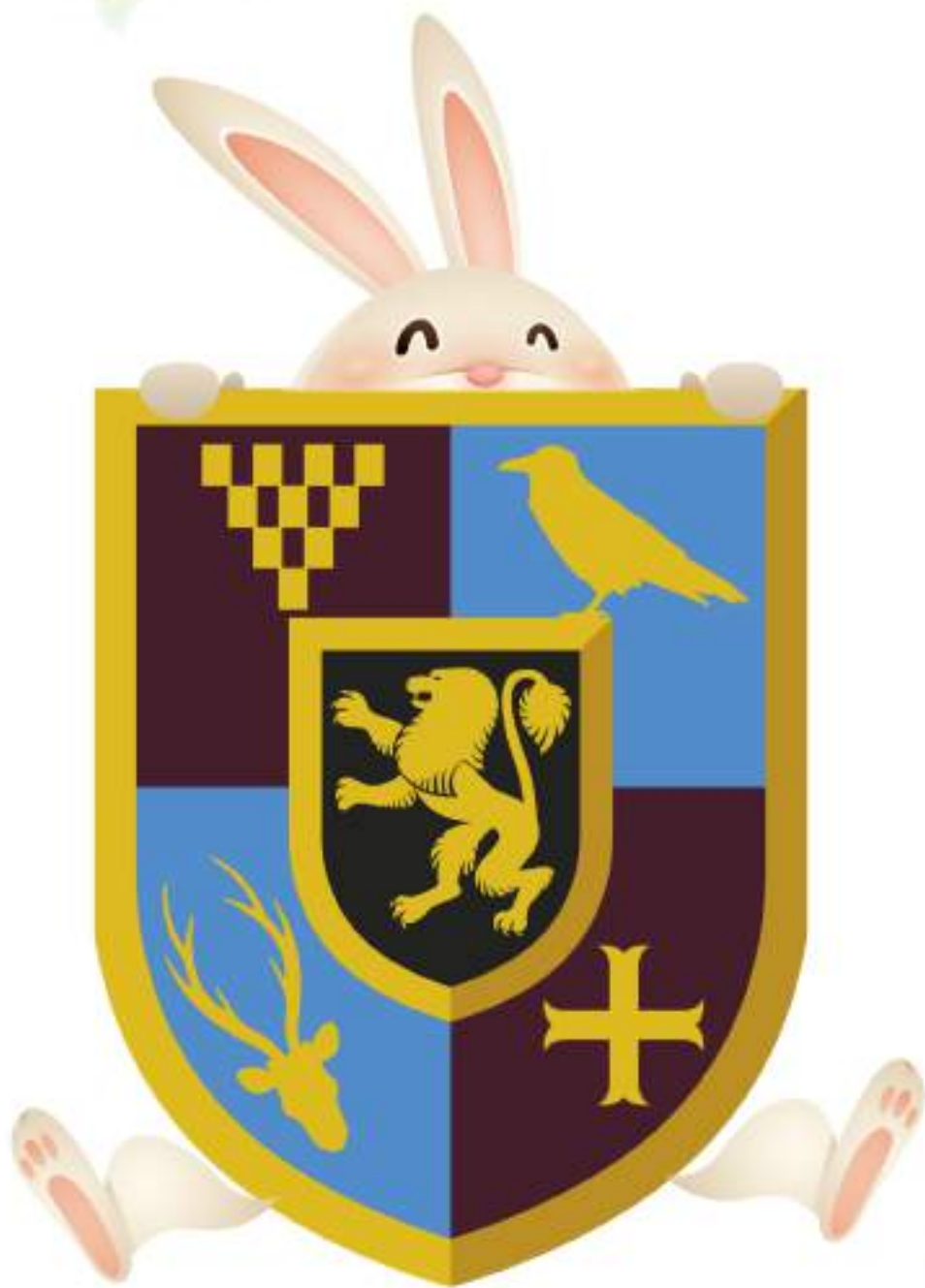
