Year 9 - Brilliant Term







TOP TIPS TO PROTECT YOUR BIKE

M Mark your bike

Attend a free bike marking event advertised by Merseyside Police. These are advertised on the local Merseyside Police social media channels. Your make is 83% less likely to be stolen if it is both marked and registered.

A Awareness

When you are out on your bike be aware of your surroundings and don't let thieves try to steal it. When out on the street leave your bike in a well lit area where it can be seen by passers by. Lock both wheels and the frame to a cycle strand, or an immoveable object. Make sure the lock goes through the frame, wheel and the post you are securing it to. Take any removable items with you.

R Register your bike

Register your bike for free by visiting The National Cycle Crime Database/BikeRegister. Merseyside Police are now actively checking bikes on the National Cycle Database. If your bike is stolen, this will significantly increase the chances of you getting your bike back. Scan the QR code (to the right) to register your bike on BikeRegister.

K Keep out of view

When at home store your bike in a shed or garage. Don't leave the bike unattended outside the front of your house. Remember to secure it to an immovable object.

I Insure

If you have invested a significant amount of money into your bike, consider specialist bike insurance or check your home insurance covers you for theft away from home.

T Top bike lock

A decent bike lock is worth its weight in gold. A heavy-duty bike lock can make thieves' jobs more difficult, often meaning they want to steal a bike that is less secure. Make sure you buy a Sold Secure Diamond or Gold Lock.

Geography News

Catch the Wind with Gayle: Our New School Weather Station Goes Live!

The Geography Department is excited to announce the arrival of our brand-new weather station—Gayle! Affectionately named for the gusty conditions often experienced atop our school building, Gayle has taken pride of place on the roof, in full view of the Humanities block. And she's already proving to be an incredibly valuable teaching tool.

Gayle is no ordinary piece of equipment. This advanced station measures a wide range of meteorological variables in real time, including:

- Air Pressure
- Dew Point
- Indoor and Outdoor Temperature
- Rainfall
- UV Index
- Solar Radiation
- Humidity
- Wind Direction



With such a variety of live data being collected, our students can now observe and explore weather patterns as they happen—without even leaving the classroom. The station not only displays instant readings on a tablet located in the Humanities office, but also sends data to an online weather portal, where it's stored and graphed over days, weeks, and months. This allows us to track long-term trends and seasonal changes with ease.

One of the most exciting aspects of Gayle's capabilities is how it brings complex concepts to life. For instance, students often find it difficult to grasp the link between air pressure and cloud cover. With real-time visualisations and graphs, they can now see how changes in pressure correlate with the arrival of clouds or clear skies, deepening their understanding of key meteorological principles.

Gayle has now been officially registered, meaning that others in our local area—and beyond—can also track her data. If you're interested in watching the weather unfold alongside us, follow the link below or head over to our Instagram page: @rangegeogdept, where you'll find regular updates and a direct link to Gayle's readings.



This station is not only helping us track the elements but is blowing new life into our lessons—*pun definitely intended*.



London Trip

Looking forward to the end of the year, planning is taking place for an exciting Art and Photography A level trip, where pupils in both Year 12 and 13, have a fantastic opportunity to visit our capital city, London. This is an exciting festive trip to enhance pupil's exposure to cultural experiences, taking place from the 3rd of December.

Unmissable highlights of the trip include a visit to Madame Tussauds and Marvel Universe 4D, the Skydeck at the Shard, Southbank Christmas markets and the Illuminated River. 
Intermediate Biology Olympiad

Got to have brains for Psychology



As part of their Biopsychology unit, Year 12 Psychology students took part in a hands-on brain dissection to deepen their understanding of brain structure and function. The activity allowed students to explore key regions such as the cerebrum, cerebellum, and brainstem, linking theoretical knowledge to real anatomical features. Students were able to conduct their own commissurotomy (the severing of the corpus callosum, which joins the two hemispheres together), gaining valuable insights into how biological structures underpin psychological processes. The experience not only enhanced their scientific skills but also sparked thoughtful discussions about the complexity of the human brain.

The Computer Science department is thrilled to showcase the incredible work of two of our new Digital Leaders, who have designed and built an impressive physical computing project entirely in their own time.



This interactive device generates a random number between 1 and 10 when the large red button is pressed. Depending on the result, the screen flashes either a vibrant “You Win!” or a bold “You Lose!” message, accompanied by custom images designed by the students themselves.

This isn’t just a display piece — it’s a fully functioning experience. The students programmed the machine using Python, building on what they’ve learned in lessons and pushing far beyond, exploring a wide range of external libraries to bring their vision to life. They even added sound effects and flashing LED lights, which create excitement as the number is generated, and then change colour depending on the result.

The students also included a distance sensor to enhance the interactivity and added multiple modes of play — with one version being slightly more generous than the other! Their technical skills were matched by their dedication. They sourced all the components themselves, soldered the electronic parts at home, and even created their own project emblems. The final product is a fun and educational piece of physical computing that combines design, programming, and electronics in a highly creative way.

While the name “Fruit Machine” may bring to mind traditional gaming machines, this project is entirely educational and creative in nature — a celebration of computing skills, problem solving, and innovation, not gambling.

We’re incredibly proud of what these Digital Leaders have achieved and can’t wait to see what they create next.
